**REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY:** The Parish Council would like to express appreciation to everyone involved in the Service of Remembrance at the War Memorial. Perhaps though, the greatest thank you should go to Flt Lt Tony Shingles RAF (Ret). We received a significant number of nominations for people worthy of recognition and after much deliberation, Tony was chosen to deliver the Exhortation and the Kohima Epitaph. Having served with the RAF Flying Mosquitos during the war, he stayed on to complete regular service after 1945. He has also made a tremendous contribution to the village, being involved with the Newsletter for over 25 years. Now in his 90s, Tony delivered his lines with great professionalism and hopefully made us all realise exactly why we were stood there in front of the Cenotaph that morning. It is with immeasurable gratitude to Tony and the many thousands like him that we have our freedom today; we remain forever in their debt.

**RECREATION CLUB:** Having only taken over as Trustees of the Recreation Club in March 2014, it took the Parish Council some time to get to grips with the challenges at hand, but thanks to a small band of willing volunteers we are making great progress! A QUERY?! Dr Stephen Harrison's new history of Nafferton is nearing completion. Can anyone help with this query? On 8 October 1824 Nafferton resident John Danby died. He was buried three days later, not in the churchyard but at his home address. The details are recorded in the parish register: 'The whole Service was read in the Church and afterwards his body was interred in his own garden at the North End of the Town'. Presumably the 'North End of the Town' refers to High Street and/or North Street, possibly also Driffield Road. Despite extensive research Stephen has not been able to locate Danby's address. #### **NAFFERTON** SPORTS TALENT!

We all know that Britain's got talent, 'But where is it?' you might ask! Well you will be pleased to know that some of it is right here in Nafferton!



Just over a month ago, James Lee of Rectory Close, competed at the Emirates Arena in Glasgow and became the British Kata Karate open age Champion. At age 18 he fought off the best from various countries to be crowned champion but he didn't stop there, he went on to take silver in a separate under-21 competition.

A week or two later he competed in the Eindhoven Open International in Holland. He entered two categories, Senior Brown and Black Belt and the Open category. The standard of Kata was very high, with Belgium and Dutch champions competing in both categories. After 5 gruelling rounds in each category, James found himself in both finals, where he was narrowly beaten. However gaining silver in both sections was a great achievement.

James started karate at the age of five and now trains with the Hull and East Riding Karate Academy, under the instruction of Wayne Clark. He has had his fair share of injuries, which unfortunately goes with this type of sport, but he is becoming well respected within Karate and is strongly tipped to be selected for the England squad at the forthcoming selections.

Sadly there is no funding for Karate so competing at a high level can be very expensive and the English Karate Federation is hoping that the sport will be included at the next Olympics. Congratulations also go to Niamh Titchener, a junior archer at 'Archers of East Riding' Cranswick, who recently represented Yorkshire in the FIVE counties tournament held in Cheshire helping the junior girls win the 'RECURVE TROPHY', for the first time since 2006!



Nafferton Primary School also enjoyed success this term, winning the first round of the junior Athletics tournament at Driffield Sports Hall in November. Competing in a range of activities including javelin, long jump, speed bounce

and relay, both year 3-4 and 5-6 teams beat competition from Burton Agnes, Kilham and Driffield to secure their place in round 2, to be held in Beverley next term!

#### **Financing the Nafferton Newsletter**

In the August Newsletter (no 75), we provided some background as to the production of our village Newsletter, but we didn't mention how it was financed and let me stress immediately, this is not a begging letter. As you are aware it is a bi-monthly production and normally 4 pages just about covers our needs. However this past year we have had cause to make the Newsletter a 'six-pager' on not just one occasion, but three (now four)! Needless to say the six-pager costs one and a half times that of a 4-pager.

Although the 3 editor/compilers do not request payment, the Co-ordinators try to defray some of their costs with a small annual donation. So where does the money come from to finance this important village activitv?

Well over the years the Parish Council and the Nafferton Millennium Committee have sponsored the Newsletter with an annual donation of £250 each and until this year that has kept the Newsletter afloat. We must also appreciate that the number of houses has increased considerably over the past few years and the 'print-run' now runs to 1140 Newsletters per issue and as you can guess printing costs have also increased, so coupled with the need for 3 issues being six-pagers, we were very close to running out of funds. However the Nafferton Feoffees Charity Trust came very quickly to our rescue with a one-off donation of £250 which has ensured the Newsletter will survive.

So without going into finite detail, on behalf of all the Nafferton residents we offer our thanks to the Parish Council, the Millennium Committee and additionally the Nafferton Feoffees Charity Trust for their financial support, both past, present and hopefully future.

### NAFFERTON FUN FAIR

The Fun Fair, held at Nafferton's Recreation Ground from 1-4 October this year, was enjoyed by many who appreciated having something fun and new in the Village - but to others, its arrival was less than welcome.

The Parish Council, sole trustees of the Rec Club, voted at their September meeting to hold the Fair in early October, although there were concerns raised over possible damage to the ground and potential harm to relationships with sports clubs and neighbouring residents.

A group of 10 residents, living adjacent to the Rec, were less than happy to have it on their doorstep and wrote a letter of complaint to the Parish Council following the event. This was copied to the Nafferton Newsletter and the Parish Council have since issued a report regarding the Fun Fair, addressing the issues raised in the letter, plus details concerning the timing and planning of the event. Both letter and report are available, in full, to view on the <u>Nafferton.net</u> website.

In their letter, the signatories conveyed disappointment with the decisions of the PC regarding the Fair and asked the PC to explain the reasons behind their decisions. They criticised:

- The lack of consultation (before, during or after the event) with the locals living closest to and thereby most affected by the proximity of the fair, including senior citizens
- Late notice (just 8-10 days) of the Fair's arrival
- The size of the vehicles required to bring the rides and consequential problems with access, road congestion and damage to grass
- The litter deposited in front gardens by people leaving the fair
- Diesel spilt on the roads by the fair vehicles leaving

In their report, the Parish Council explain why notice was so short, stating that whilst the Fair had been on the PC/Rec Club agenda as a possible event for some months, a meeting with Fair organisers to assess the site, and access to it, had not been achieved until Sat 13<sup>th</sup> Sept. Once confirmed that access was 'acceptable', the Fair was tabled as a formal agenda item at the next Rec meeting (15<sup>th</sup> Sept.) As Fair organisers had only early October available in their annual schedule, the committee voted to hold the event in just 16 days' time as the alternative was to wait 12 ½ months for the next available slot. Although the PC recognised the short timescale was not ideal, it was agreed October 2014 was feasible, and a project plan put into place.

The Rec committee held a follow-up meeting on September 26<sup>th</sup>, at which it was confirmed all necessary regulatory paperwork and plans were in order. Some residents attended this informal meeting and again, concerns over potential noise, access and damage were raised, together with issues of notice and lack of engagement with residents. The residents in attendance accepted however, that risks had been mitigated where practically possible and points on timing and consultation were taken on board for future events.

The Fair operated for 3 of its advertised 4 days, during which time the PC received many enthusiastic comments from Fair-goers in person, through emails and Facebook:

"...The Fair is a great idea! As was the scarecrow festival earlier this year and hopefully there will be many more community events in the future."

"Had a lovely evening at the fair. The guys on the rides were great with the kids and very friendly. Support staff visible and reassuring. Well done to the committee!" "...I always admire those who try new ideas to bring communities together. Look at the Scarecrow Festival; major triumph! ..."

Due to inclement weather on Sat 4<sup>th</sup>, the Fair operators took the decision to pack up early. Protection of the pitches was paramount to the Parish Council, and considerate of this, Fair operators moved their heavy machinery before any real damage was done. As a result, only a small amount of repair work to the outfields was needed, which PC volunteers performed on 11<sup>th</sup> Oct to the groundsman's satisfaction - although the PC do apologise to any residents who had planned to go to the Fair that day only to be disappointed.

The PC received one complaint upon the Fair's departure concerning spilt diesel and damage reportedly caused to kerb stones. Local police officer, Chris Webster, went to assess but couldn't see any damage to the kerbs; the diesel spillage, caused whilst the Fair operators waited for residents' vehicles to be moved, was slight, and sand duly applied.

In response to the letter received by the 10 local residents, one of the signatories attended the monthly Rec Club meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> October and was given a full breakdown of the timeline and reasons behind decisions concerning the event. The Parish Council did perform leafleting and door knocking to inform local residents beforehand, but concede due to the limited time frame, and notwithstanding that all the Parish Council members are volunteers and have other commitments to family and work, insufficient consultation was given to residents on this occasion.

On balance, the PC deemed the event a success based on the following factors:

- The Recreation Club benefited from a hiring charge funds are badly needed to make the operation selffunding
- The Recreation Club benefited from higher visibility of the Rec facilities to residents that potentially would not have been there before, and hopefully will come again
- There was good attendance on the 3 days it ran, and the Fair operators would like to be considered for future events
- There were no formal complaints from residents to Parish Councillors whilst the Fair was in operation
- There were no Fair related issues where the police were called during the event
- There was very minimal / superficial damage to the Rec grounds and the surrounding areas

At the Recreation Club meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> Oct 2014, it was voted unanimously that the Fair be held again next year. The PC plan to give residents 6 months' notice of the event and are looking at alternative access routes into the Rec grounds – although it cannot be guaranteed that this will be achieved. The PC report finishes "*The aim of the Recreation Club Charity is, as stated in the conveyance documentation, "to promote sports and recreation in the village", and we hope that the Fair is just one of a number of events over the coming months that will help us do that.*"

"The Recreation facilities are for the benefit of all local residents, please feel free to utilise them when there are not league games or team practices on, and if you would like to volunteer, or have any ideas on how we can improve things going forward, please contact us on <u>Nafferton.net</u>, , via our facebook page <u>www.facebook.com/NaffertonRecreationClub</u>, or attend
